The United Cursillo Community of Minnesota consists of 2,450 fourth dayers, 80 affiliated clergy and 52 member-churches. The United Cursillo Council consists of 15 lay persons who serve a three-year term. Three clergy members serve a one- to three-year term.

Council members are cursillistas with team leadership experience. About one-third of council members have been a Cursillo rector or rectora.

The council, which meets formally once a month, has the following responsibilities:

- Manage the community's finances.
- Allocate weekend "slots" on a fair and equitable basis.
- 3. Select and nurture new churches in the community.
- 4. Select weekend dates and sites.
- Manage council-owned supplies and coordinate use of jointly-owned supplies with the Episcopal community.
- Gather news and publish Palanca Press newsletter. 6.
- select and recruit weekend clergy and lay leaders. 7.
- Train weekend team members. 8.
- Supervise development of printed materials used for team training and weekend instruction.
- Develop palanca support for weekenders throughout the 10. world.
- Function as a catalyst in the formation of the United TEC 11. movement.
- 12. Foster a Christ-centered community, based on love, for all council and fourth day members.

The council's primary objective for 1987-88 is to improve the process of selecting weekend leadership. The problem in the past has not been with quality of leadership but rather with inconsistency of lead-time in securing leaders. We believe that if we can select weekend leaders earlier, the team selection and team building processes will be more effective.

Adequate lead-time is particularly important in selecting clergy for the spiritual director positions because the total number of available clergy is limited and many clergy must set their schedules many months in advance. Because of the problems associated with recruiting clergy, the council encourages clergy to serve on at least one team every three years.

The United Cursillo Council exists to serve you. Council members are your voice within the United Cursillo community. Please contact a council member if you have concerns or issues that you would like discussed or acted upon.

A MINNESOTA KAIROS UPDATE

By Madonna Kerber On October 12, 40 Cursillistas from the Episcopal, Catholic, Lutheran and United communities entered Sandstone Federal Prison to facilitate a Kairos weekend. Guided by the Holy Spirit, these men and women of black, Spanish and Caucasian descent have chosen Kairos as a method of apostolic action.

The purpose and dynamics of Kairos are the same as Cursillo: To Christianize one's environment...in this case, Sandstone Prison

and the inmates' family and friends.

The inmates on that weekend were from around the world -- Guam, Sicily, Nicaragua, London, South America, U.S., to name just a few. Approximately 100 of the prison's 750 inmates were involved, either as weekenders or team members.

Inmates on the first day typically are trying to figure out who all these happy people are from the outside and "what's in it for them?" They're suspicious about our motives...why would people leave their families and travel 125 miles to sleep on a cold church floor to spend four days with a bunch of cons?!

By Day Two, they are beginning to believe the team is for real, that our motive is unconditional love, that our happiness comes from within, and that we enjoy sleeping on cold church floors.

As the message of the speaker filters through the inmates' minds and down into their hearts, they realize they are surrounded with more love than they have ever experienced. The gospel comes alive and real to them. Words take on a new dimension: God is love! Love one another! Come follow me!

The walls they have built to protect themselves from being used or abused in the institution start to come down brick by brick. They begin to open up and develop a trust relationship with one another. They become vulnerable as they share their love for Jesus Christ with each other and once this is done with sincerity, the doors to a meaningful relationship with God and fellow man

Kairos weekends were recently completed at the women's prison in Shakopee and the federal medical correctional facility in Rochester. The 150 inmates that attended these three prison Kairos weekends and are now 4th Dayers have an awesome responsibility to Christianize their respective prison environments. Many of them will make a friend, be a friend and bring that friend to Christ.

If your Cursillo renewal or church group would like to make a banner for Kairos, we would deeply appreciate it. We would like to acquire our own set of banners by mid-February. Any size and color is acceptable.

We are in the process of team selection right now and will

likely conduct a minimum of six Kairos weekends in 1988. We need team members — both lay and spiritual directors. We ask you to pray about this and, if the spirit moves you, to call. We will tell you how to become involved in this very rewarding 4th Day ministry. Our harvest is plenty and our laborers are few. Come with us into the field.

If you would like to attend a reunion (ultreya) at one of these facilities, we can work this out. It is a good way to get a feel for what we are about. We have them monthly at each facility. The inmates are not asked to make a financial contribution to the weekend. Our funds are generated by word of mouth from teams and from a few churches and individuals who believe in what Kairos is doing. JANUARY WEEKENDS TO FEATURE 'LIVING STATIONS'

In July, the Single Women's Cursillo at St. Croix Valley United Methodist presented the Friday evening Stations of the Cross using "living models" at each of the stations. Many team members and weekenders who took part have indicated that the living stations approach was for them a more dramatic experience of Christ's final hours than earlier experiences with traditional inanimate stations.

Helen Davis (Hope Presbyterian) was invited to the October United Cursillo council meeting to demonstrate the living stations technique. It involves dressing models in shroud-like garments (created by Helen) and teaching them to assume the pose or posture that characterizes the scene at each station. The models' identify is concealed by the garments.

Based on Helen's demonstration and feedback from July weekend participants, the council agreed to adopt the living stations for the January and May United weekends...if the use of living stations at these four weekends is positive, living stations will become a permanent option for future United weekends.

Helen has agreed to serve as living stations advisor for these four weekends and has volunteered the services of Hope Presbyterian cursillistas as the living models.

A BOUNDARY CURSILLO EXPERIENCE

On the trust of those who had gone before us, we entered the Boundary Waters Canoe Area. I had been before but not on this particular course and not with a "first-dayer."

My companion trusted me and looked forward to promised enjoyment. We set out on a large lake and, after winding our way around small islands, spotted our first portage, 320 rods...one mile long. John unsteadily lifted the canoe out of the water as he had been taught in a crash course by an outfitter 10 minutes before entering this mysterious land.

He awkwardly, but bravely, struck out with canoe <u>and</u> bulging Duluth pack. I led the way to help navigate over fallen trees, around huge rocks (small boulders was John's perhaps more accurate description), 60 degree inclines, and quicksand-like puddles that reflected the previous day's storm. The portage was narrow and rough. John accepted most challenges; to some he succumbed. On the lakes, head winds met us and campsites alluded us till finally we found a place to rest our tired bodies.

Lying on unfamiliar pads in the ominous dark the first night brought fear and at the same time wonder about this chosen experience.

Too tired and sore to sleep past dawn, John got up and struggled to build a fire, conjuring up past Boy Scout lessons, while I gathered wood. Like two strangers we worked clumsily together to provide a Spartan breakfast. While choosing a spot by the cold lake to scrub blackened cook pots, John guessed what a second day in the BWCA could be like. It had to get better...and it did.

Tender moments...sad ones...periods of reflection...love...absorbing God's wonder...peace and joy. The day was filled like no other day. Meals became more elaborate as the primitive cooking became familiar. We added to our campsite to create a joyous place, one from which we would be sad to part but happy to reflect on memories.

On the third day our journey back took a different route. Head winds forced rain into our faces but we felt strong and undaunted. We freely laughed and ate gorp and candy bars as the sun found a spot in the sky to see us home and winds eased into gentle breezes. Each portage toward home became wider, less rocky; path sides were sprinkled with wild flowers. We burst into our final destination, the place where we had started, changed somehow. An inner peace and joy seemed prevalent; a sense of having been God's special guests in a special place was real.

The glory of the experience will fade with time but on the fourth day we'll know we are more than we were and more is expected of us. We need to share, not the experience itself for that's impossible, but a new dimension in our lives, a new layer to our souls.
